Five screenings will be offered that scan for potential health problems related to: blocked arteries which is a leading cause of stroke; abdominal aortic aneurysms which can lead to a ruptured aorta; hardening of the arteries in the legs which is a strong predictor of heart disease; atrial fibrillation or irregular heart beat which is closely tied to stroke risk; and a bone density screening, for men and women, used to assess the risk of osteoporosis. Connection Lost

"Community, accountability, and correction are fundamental to faith: without them our wills rather than Christ will dominate." Mark Sayers

We live in an America that is often described as Post-Christian. But pastor and author Mark Sayers says that this is inaccurate. He notes that most people still have some connection to the Church, but no longer follow its teachings. Instead, they follow public opinion, which has become an alternate form of revelation, replacing the Bible. Why is that?

Since the end of World War II, America has gradually, and since the 1960s, rapidly, moved away from traditional values that place limits on our choices. The war made us into an industrial giant that produces consumer goods and services with such efficiency that it sometimes seems that we can literally have and experience anything we want. Early on, advertisers learned how to overcome the sales resistance of children of the Depression, who were very frugal, by telling them repeatedly that, "You deserve it." And credit plans made it easy to buy it today. And so, we learned to live as consumers first and Christians second. The Bible places restrictions on our choices, and so, most of it had to go.

Indeed, the values of consumerism came to dominate our lives in every respect. James Fowler of Harvard states that these values tell us "you should experience everything that you desire, own everything that you want and relate intimately with whomever you wish."

Unfortunately, to live this way, we had to abandon the things that gave our lives meaning and purpose. In the past, people got their educations, got jobs and got married before they had children. In 1960, the out-of-wedlock birthrate was only 5%. Now 40% of all births in America are to unwed mothers. Adults are free of the "stifling" commitments that restrict their freedom and children must pay the price. But there is no shame in living this way because the only values left in our consumer society are tolerance and kindness. And we refuse to see any connection between the breakdown of commitment between fathers and mothers and the breakdown of respect for authority. "It takes a village to raise a child" now. So, it is the community's responsibility. But we don't want community because community also requires commitment from individuals.

In church, we still like to hear the stories of "gentle Jesus, meek and mild," the Jesus of mercy and forgiveness. We don't like to hear his commands and hard sayings. We try to tune out the preacher when he quotes Jesus saying, "Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me." That doesn't sound like fun at all. It is such a different message than "it is all about me." For some, it is so disturbing to hear such things, we have to take a few Sundays off. Isn't that why we stopped reading the Bible and attending Bible study? The Bible is full of confusing statements like that.

So, we don't live in a post-Christian society so much as we live in a post-covenantal society. As Mark Sayers puts it, "The ideas of covenant and whole-hearted commitment are anathema to the culture of ...radical individualism."

Covenantal people make life-long commitments to their husbands or wives. They pledge to take responsibility for raising their children with kindness and firmness, seeing to it they get everything they need to become the people they were created to be. They surrender themselves to Jesus as their Lord and Savior, trusting God to lead them into His paths of righteousness and believing that He will supply their needs if they are obedient. They understand that they are God's servants, not the other way around.

I recommend two books by Mark Sayers. *Disappearing Church: from Cultural Relevance to Gospel Resilience* is a good one to help Christians stand up for their faith in these difficult times. *The Road Trip that Changed the World: The Unlikely Theory that will Change How You View Culture, the Church, and, Most Importantly, Yourself* had the greater influence on this month's blog.

Food needed is: Fried Chicken, peanut butter and pimento cheese sandwiches, home baked cookies, brownies, homemade cakes (pre-sliced and each sliced wrapped in clear plastic. All food MUST BE wrapped in Clear plastic and please use throw away containers to put them in. All food MUST BE at church no later than 10AM on 9/10.

Saturday, October 22nd - 9:00 AM - Noon the Alice Thompson Mission Group will host a "Pat Coogler" sew and craft day. If you have a portable sewing machine, please bring with you. We will be making aprons from men's long sleeve shirts, so pick your favorite shirt and bring with you also. We will also be shown how to make bibs from towels for our shut-in's. We will have several towels that we can use, however if you wish, please bring a towel. (PS - we get them from Wal-Mart for less than \$3.00) We will also have some types of crafts for the folks who do not sew. Light refreshments will also be furnished. Watch your bulletin for crafts that might be added. All church members, neighbors and friends are welcome.

We will also need: writing tablets (these can be the Jr. legal pads -no wire bound) toothpaste (6oz. or larger) adult toothbrushes, rolls of mints (like life savers or Mentos). These can be left in the church office or given to Frances Grant or Sharon Davis.


Homebound News
